PASTOR'S REPORT

Dear Members & Friends of First Presbyterian Church,

Many of you know that my favorite story in the Old Testament is the long narrative of Joseph and his brothers found in the second half of Genesis. I love how that story plays out over the course of many years. There are ups and downs for Jacob's sons that are every bit as intriguing as a soap opera!

If you stick with the story of Joseph long enough, you discover that there is a happy ending. The family is saved from famine and everyone is reconciled. "What you meant for evil" Joseph tells his brothers, "God meant for good." But if you were to stop at any given point in the narrative and take a quick snapshot, things would look pretty bleak. There's sibling rivalry, potential murder, kidnapping, slavery, and incarceration just to name a few!

That's the problem with snapshots, they don't give us the full story. They don't allow us to see the (potentially happy) ending. They only tell part of the story from somewhere in the middle.

I often think of annual reports, such as the one you're currently reading, as snapshots. In these pages we see snapshots of the year that is now past. We catch glimpses of the good and the bad. We get a brief look at all the ways First Presbyterian Church has been living out our mission here on this historic square in Carlisle.

Snapshots are great, but they don't tell the whole story. To know the whole story is to know you, the people of First Presbyterian Church. To know the whole story is to know the dedication of elders serving on Session and deacons serving the community. To know the whole story is to know the powerful discussions about the meaning of faith in Sunday school and Bible Study and Space for God. To know the whole story is to know the generosity of this congregation that is manifest in more ways than I can list. To know the whole story is to know our commitment to mission both here in Carlisle and around the world. To know the whole story is to know the prayers said for and with brothers and sisters in Christ.

This report doesn't tell the whole story of First Presbyterian Church. But it does give you a pretty good idea of what we're all about as a congregation. There are good times and bad times recorded in the pages of this report. But just like Joseph and his brothers, I believe we are moving in the right direction. We may not know what tomorrow will bring, but we trust that our future is in God's hands.

As I look through the pages of this report, I'm reminded once again just how blessed I am to be your pastor. 2019 was a hard year in many ways. We said goodbye to many faithful, longtime members. We celebrated Debby Madden's ministry and wished her well in retirement. 2020 will be a year of change and transition, but through it all please remember, God remains faithful!

In October of 2000, I first met with Rev. Jon Black to discuss a part-time Christian Educator job at First Presbyterian Church in Carlisle. I agreed to think about it and a few weeks later I was interviewed by the Human Resources Committee which included Dan Deardorff, Sue Squibb, and the late Jim Neslund and John Romberger. The committee and I agreed about the position and with careful consideration, we decided on 01/01/01 as my start date. And the rest as they say is history.

But what a history it has been! My tenure at First Presbyterian has given me more dear friends, has deepened by faith, and has enriched my life more than I ever imagined. I hope I have reciprocated these gifts to me by being a dear friend to many, helping young and old deepen their faith, and enriching the lives of church members.

Here are some statistics from my years at First Presbyterian:

- Book Club has read at least 175 books.
- Prayer Community has prayed for at least 300 people.
- Bible Study and Sunday school classes have studied all 66 books of the Bible.
- The 12 minor prophets and 12 disciples have "visited" our sanctuary.
- 20 people attended Youth Triennium events.
- Over 50 youth have been confirmed.
- 75 people have helped on Mission Sundays and participated in mission trips.

I could continue with numbers, but they are not as important as all the relationships with Christ and with each other that I hope my time at First Church helped create and grow.

I would be remiss if I did not once again thank everyone for their part in my generous retirement celebrations and gifts. It has been my honor, privilege, and joy to serve First Presbyterian from 2001 through 2019. May God bless each of you.

CLERK OF SESSION REPORT FOR 2019

The Session of the First Presbyterian Church of Carlisle, Pa. for 2019 consisted of fourteen Ruling Elders: Barbara Allen, Bruce Bailey, Richard Darr, David Killian, Lois Lloyd, Lynda Mann, Frank Meehan, Deb Ryerson, Fred Seltzer, Tom Sheperd, Richard Sommers, Ray Thomas, Charlie Thompson and Carlton Walker. Dr. Sommers served as clerk until his untimely death. At that point, Charlie Thompson was elected to serve as his replacement.

Session scheduled and held eleven stated meetings through the year. We also held three special meetings: March 10, to receive new members; June 2, to meet with a group of our young confirmands and review their statements of faith; and June 9, to meet with the remainder of the confirmation class and subsequently receive all nine of them into membership.

Congregational meetings took place on February 3 (annual meeting), and November 24. In the November meeting, we elected Barbara Allen and Lynda Mann to their second three-year terms on Session; and elected Joe Shane to a first term on the board. One seat remains open.

Our church received 21 new members during the course of the year: 10 by profession of faith, including all nine of our confirmands; nine by reaffirmation of faith; and two by letter of transfer from another congregation in Carlisle.

We regretted the departure of three members by letter of transfer to Derry Presbyterian Church in Hershey, and the voluntary transfer to inactive status of a fourth member. And finally, we gave thanks for the lives of eight long-time members who died, but entered the Church Triumphant, as well as the loss of four additional inactive members and friends of the church.

With 21 new members and 12 departures, the roll of church members grew by nine to 242.

There were no weddings in 2019, but we did as a congregation celebrate the baptism of Evelyn Noreen Graver, daughter of Wade and Rachel Graver and granddaughter of Bruce and Trudy Bailey, on January 13.

Throughout 2019, we all, as a congregation, worked and worshipped to the Glory of God.

WORSHIP COMMITTEE

Committee Members: Pastor Tony Lorenz, Debby Madden; Lynda Mann; Peggy McKeehen; Sue Shuey; Art Thompson; Richard Tritt; Deb Ryerson (Chair)

The Committee supports the activities of those who plan and lead worship on a weekly basis, including Pastor Tony, Sue Shuey and the choir, and organist Art Thompson, for whom we are all grateful. Our committee met seven times in 2019 and did the following:

- Took over some of Debby Madden's responsibilities, including serving gluten-free elements, ordering Advent wreath candles, and recruiting readers for the lighting of the Advent candles. This year, all of the readers and candle lighters were relatively new members of the congregation. We will also be responsible for the Advent Devotional this year.
- Longtime Flower Committee coordinators Joan Line and Nancy Augustine announced their retirements, and the Flower Committee was placed under the purview of the Worship Committee. We recruited Megan Crum to chair the Flower Committee and Lynne Hofferica to serve as its treasurer. We are grateful for their willingness to serve and will assist them when needed.
- Recruited readers and ushers and developed list of worship workers twice yearly.
 Also conducted a September 15 Usher Training Program. Good attendance!
- Oversaw 13 communions and four home communions, making sure that helpers
 were assigned for preparation, serving, and clean-up. This year, we took over serving
 the gluten-free elements and designated a server for those members who cannot
 come forward for communion by intinction. Pastor Tony is looking for a special tray
 for that purpose.
- Through Art Thompson's leadership, oversaw another successful Lenten Concert Series.
- Through leadership of Richard Tritt and Bob Davis, oversaw Hanging of the Greens for Advent and Christmas and un-decorating in early January. The December 8 Hanging of the Greens began with a congregational luncheon and concluded with a brief carol sing. The decorating went smoothly. Prior to the first Sunday in Advent, a small group, including Richard and Nancy Tritt, Bob Davis, Lynda Mann, and Deb Ryerson hung the garlands and the gaslight torchieres. We plan to continue this practice in 2020.
- Submitted a \$4,050 budget request for 2020, \$200 greater than last year's budget.
 This sum will help to cover pulpit supply during Tony's absences since Debby will not be here to sub for him.

 Chair Deb Ryerson took over the scheduling of an Active Shooter Presentation by the PA State Police, which will likely happen in February or March 2020. We are planning to invite members of other churches to attend the hour-long presentation and discussion. In light of numerous church incidents in 2019, the Session has been discussing the scheduling of this program.

HUMAN RESOURCES COMMITTEE

In 2019, the Human Resources Committee consisted of the same members as the two prior years: Barbara Allen; Jim Crum; Ellen Darr; and Dick Darr (Chairman).

Starting January 1, 2020, all current staff members will receive merit salary increases. The amounts vary from 1 to 3 percent, based on various factors. The Committee feels we are blessed to have such a fine staff, with each member performing at a high level.

In the summer of 2019 we learned of Debby Madden's planned retirement before the end of the year. She was an important and valued staff member for 20 years, and will be greatly missed.

Starting in July, the Committee met monthly to discuss the position of Christian Educator. Over the course of Debby's long tenure, the position evolved from part-time to full-time. With guidance from Pastor Lorenz, we have changed the position back to part-time. This involves eliminating some activities and asking for more volunteer efforts by the church membership. Before the end of 2019 we were able to provide a new job description that was approved by Session. We hope to fill the Christian educator position in early 2020. The position is budgeted for an annual salary of \$20,000. With benefits, the total compensation will be \$26,000 compared to over \$60,000 last year.

MISSION & INTERPRETATION COMMITTEE

In 2019, the Committee continued to support both local and international missions of our church.

LOCAL:

- We voted to financially support four local charities: Community CARES; Maranatha;
 the PET Project; and Samaritan Fellowship.
- We continued our commitment to Project SHARE through: 1) monthly soup-giving and
 2) the Lenten Concert/Luncheon Series (concerts led by Arthur Thompson; luncheons led by Bob Davis).
- In the fall of 2019 we contributed \$272.18 to the Deacons in support of their Disaster Relief Bucket Project for Church World Service. In conjunction with the afterworship assembling of the buckets, we organized a sub sandwich sale which raised \$66 for the Mission Fund.
- The Christmas Eve offering was equally divided between the Cumberland Valley chapter of Habitat for Humanity and the Presbytery's Honduras Housing Project.
- In January, we collected socks and underwear for donation to Community CARES clients.

INTERNATIONAL:

- Internationally, we continued to support mission efforts in Honduras. We hosted Honduras mission worker Dori Hjalmarson and teamed with the Presbyterian Women to provide a congregational luncheon for her.
- We continued to support Scott and Elmarie Parker, Middle East mission co-workers, and sent a contribution toward development of the Presbyterian Church in Irag.

We invite every member of First Presbyterian Church to join our fishing expedition to help out neighbors by sharing your ideas, time, talents and treasures with our church's mission program.

Some Property Committee highlights of 2019:

- Replacing flapper valves on all toilets
- Regular maintenance of the elevator, heating, and cooling systems

After the church was burglarized in August 2019, the Property Committee assisted in:

- Replacing damaged office doors
- Overseeing the restoration of the emergency exit doors in the Gathering Room

In 2020, the Property Committee will be re-grouping to evaluate the needs of our historic structure and to continue the high level of maintenance performed in the past.

PRESBYTERIAN WOMEN - FAITH CIRCLE

Faith Circle of First Presbyterian Church represents Presbyterian Women in the Presbytery of Carlisle. Mostly older women and small in number, we meet once a month from September through May. Although not considered an active PW group, we promote the PW Birthday and PW Thank Offerings each year. As well, we share the responsibility of collections for Blanket Sunday with the Deacons in our church. Having our own bank account, we choose to give to various needs annually, one of which in 2019, was to help finance our Pastor's trip to the Middle East. In September we worked with the Session Mission Committee to host a luncheon after worship when Honduras mission co-worker, Dori Kay Hjalmarson*, visited. On the bulletin board, we placed pictures of the retreat center in Honduras which the PW Birthday Offering helped to finance. This past December we invited all the women of the church to a holiday social held in our Fellowship Hall. Newly retired educator, Debby Madden, introduced the Horizon Bible Study, Love, Carved in Stone, which will be used by the group in 2020.

BOARD OF DEACONS

The Board of Deacons faithfully served the congregation this year in many ways.

One of our primary functions is reaching out to our shut-ins through visits, cards, and phone calls to let them know they are an important part of First Church. We also delivered Home Communion with elders to these shut-ins several times throughout the year, and took them special flowers at Christmas and Easter. Six Home Communion kits were created in special carrying cases to convey the communion elements and items for serving them.

We supported 26 members who lost loved ones through the *Journeying Through Grief* program, a series of booklets that provide comfort and helpful insights about the process of grieving. Recipients have remarked on their helpfulness. Our notecards with the pencil drawing of the church are popular and will still be sold in the church office during 2020.

New initiatives this year involved sending notes to members who were prayed for in congregational prayers each Sunday to tell them of their remembrance both in the Sunday service and at the deacons' meeting. In addition, we sent nine care packages to our college students in December just prior to their finals.

Our community outreach entailed:

- three Sunday evening dinners at My Brothers' Table at the Salvation Army;
- 108 bags of cookies for the Truck Stop Ministry in December; and
- raising over \$160 in bell ringing in early December for the Salvation Army.
- continuing to give Visitor Bags with information about us, our mission and activities to new people who worship with us.

Our donations to local organizations continued with monetary gifts to:

- Carlisle Cares
- The Adult Employment Skills Center
- Project Share
- Safe Harbor
- SPY Program
- Christian Counseling Center
- Samaritan Fellowship, and
- Maranantha.

Through our global outreach, we sponsored Mission Sunday with the Session Mission Committee, during which 100 disaster clean-up buckets were packed and shipped to Church World Service for use in emergencies throughout the world. We also sponsored Blanket Sunday on Mother's Day with the Presbyterian Women.

On Father's Day, we conducted a fundraiser that primarily supports our efforts at *My Brothers' Table*, but also helps fund our other programs throughout the year.

Thank you to everyone in the congregation who supported our missions through donations of time and money.
