PASTOR'S REPORT

Dear Members and Friends of First Presbyterian Church,

“The days are long, but the years are short” is a phrase popularized by Gretchen Rubin about a decade ago. Young, exhausted parents have claimed it as their own, but Rubin originally wrote it as one of her *Secrets of Adulthood*.

In 2025 I celebrated ten years of service as your pastor here in Carlisle. And reflecting on 2025 made me realize that the days are indeed long, but the years are short. In these pages you will find the annual report of another year of mission and ministry of First Presbyterian Church. Allow me to indulge a bit:

In **January** we returned from Christmas and welcomed the New Year. Star Gifts were distributed and I received “fearlessness” which in the end was a good word for me in 2025! Officers were ordained and installed. Session and Deacons reorganized. And we welcomed new members and celebrated two baptisms!

February was a quieter month that started with the Ice Art Fest and a beautiful Celtic cross sponsored by the congregation. Meetings went ahead as scheduled and the Men’s Fellowship Breakfast met at the Carlisle Diner. We enjoyed the Souper Bowl Luncheon and collected cans and raised funds for Project SHARE.

In **March** the Season of Lent began and we gathered for a service on Ash Wednesday. The Noontime Concert Series and Soup Luncheons kicked off the next week with another slate of talented musicians and cooks. The proceeds again went to support Project SHARE and their good work in our community. The Confirmation Class also began studying together.

In **April** we celebrated Holy Week and the joy of Easter. On Good Friday, the Community Ecumenical Crosswalk stopped at First Church again. The confirmation class continued to meet and learn about the Christian faith and what it means to trust in Jesus. We received new members.

In **May**, spring finally sprang and the month had two definite highlights: on May 4 we welcomed the six members of the Confirmation Class into the membership of the church. Then on May 18 our incredible choir took center stage for Music/Choir Sunday and provided a wonderful worship service filled with inspiring music. We received more new members.

June marked the beginning of the usually quieter summer months, but there was still a lot going on. The Deacons and the Mission Committee purchased hundreds of bottles of sunscreen for the SPY Program (Supportive Partnerships for Youth). I was privileged to attend the Graduation Ceremony at the War College, and I finished the month with a week of vacation.

The month of **July** was quiet. I met a researcher in town from Australia. She was learning about one of her ancestors who was a member of First and owned a tavern in Carlisle back in the 1760s and 1770s. At the end of the month I attended a preaching seminar on the Kingdom of God at Calvin Theological Seminary in Grand Rapids, Michigan.

I packed my bags again in **August** and this time headed for Honduras. Presbyterian World Mission was going through a lot of changes in 2025 and our long-time mission co-worker, the Rev. Dori Hjalmarson is no longer serving in Honduras. I was part of a small team from Carlisle Presbytery that went to reassure the Honduras Presbytery of our commitment to the partnership.

In **September** we returned to our regular schedule for Sunday school and Worship. The first Sunday back was also the annual church picnic, filled with lots of good food, fellowship and fun for everyone who participated! On September 13 we hosted the Presbytery of Carlisle for a regular stated meeting. Lots of people volunteered to help with set-up, parking, food, ushering, and clean-up. It was truly a team effort and everyone appreciated our hospitality!

October was one of those good, solid months without too many surprises along the way. The church Boards met. I made a quick trip to Ohio for my uncle's funeral. And we ended the month by making hundreds of "Ghost Lollipops" for Spooky Saturday in Downtown Carlisle.

Deacons and Elders served home communion to our Care and Concern List people the first Sunday in **November**. These are folks who are not able to worship with us in person for a variety of reasons. I took a few days off to join a group of fellow pastors in reading and talking about the topic, "Life after Death." The Men's Fellowship Breakfast met at Walnut Bottom Diner. The congregation met to elect officers and approve the pastor's terms of call for 2026. We ended the month by celebrating the First Sunday of Advent in a beautifully decorated sanctuary!

December was busy: Advent Prayer Partners, poinsettia order forms, a delicious Advent Luncheon hosted by the Parish Life Committee, Deacons and friends ringing bells for the Salvation Army, and collecting Star Gifts for families at the Community CARES Family Shelter. The best part of December was of course Christmas Eve and the beautiful candlelight service.

So, yes dear friends, the days are long at times with planning and travel and visits and studies and deep, meaningful conversations. There is so much not recorded here of all the things elders and deacons and members do to make the church function and succeed. But the years, they are short! I marvel that it has been ten years since I first showed up here in Carlisle. What a blessed time it has been! I am grateful every day to be your pastor and pray God blesses the rest of our days together.

Hello Church Family,

It was an interesting and ultimately fulfilling year for your Session as we tried our best to keep First Presbyterian Church on track as a place where our members study God's love, reflect that love to each other and act on it in our lives.

The newly-streamlined Session – nine members this year, after a 2024 bylaws change – met 11 times in our regularly scheduled Stated Meetings, and then another four times for specially-scheduled “called meetings.” I’m happy to report those special meetings were all called for the best reason we can ever have to meet: The reception of new members.

Through 2025, we welcomed into membership: Luke Lyman and Sophia Wewer; Kristin Brenize-Wewer and Ian Wewer; Confirmands Emma Weiser, Noah Weiser, Sam Whitman, Colton Madison, Brenna Myers and Max Wewer; Sybil, Zack, Jake and Robert Myers and Anne Roberts-Samsel.

That’s the largest single-year crop of new members in many years at First Presbyterian Church, and it is so gratifying in so many ways. It also sets a high bar for 2026, so if you know someone in your life who is looking for a church... there’s still room on the ark.

In September, we also took our turn hosting a meeting of the Presbytery of Carlisle. Thanks to Deb Richcreek, Deb Ryerson, Susan Palyo for organizing and the more than a dozen volunteers who helped with lunch service, parking, and ushering.

This year, we saw Elders Joe Shane and Nancy Jacoby finish terms and rotate off Session. We thank them for their faithful service to the church and the congregation, on and off the board. At the end of this year, we also accepted with regret the mid-term resignation of Richard Bressler, who is heading into retirement and, happily for he and Debra, plans for a heavier travel schedule. As Property Chair, Richard oversaw several capital projects that are keeping our building cool and comfortable as it moves into the back half of its third century.

It is with great gratitude that we welcome Tricia Naylor and Matthew Weiser to new terms as Elders. We look forward to hearing their fresh ideas and employing their talents in new ways in the year ahead. Current Elders Deb Richcreek and Deb Ryerson blessed us by agreeing to re-up for new two-year terms.

As a congregation, we mourned the deaths of members Joe Dennison, Peggy McKeehen, Marcia Toms in 2025, along with the passing our beloved friend the Rev. Bill Beck, but are happy in the certain promise that they are now seeing the fruits of their faith revealed. And we celebrated the baptisms of Luke Lyman and Senna, Luke and Sophia’s daughter.

As our congregation continues to grow and evolve, take a moment to cherish the extended family we continue to find in each other, and be attentive to where God leads us on our faith journey in the years ahead.

WORSHIP COMMITTEE

The Committee supports the activities of those who plan and lead worship every week, including Pastor Tony, music director Ron Richcreek, organist Art Thompson, and choir members, for whom we are all grateful.

- Our committee met three times in person (January 8, September 10 and November 5) and communicated by email (April 16 and November 28).
- Committee members provided readers (Deb Ryerson), ushers (Lynda Mann and Ray Thomas), and communion servers (Deb Richcreek).
- A combined list and instructions were given to servers for January–June and July–December.
- Committee member, Deb Ryerson, continued as coordinator for the altar flowers.
- Art Thompson and Deb Richcreek organized the Lenten concerts and luncheons.
- We thank organists David Erikson, Janis Glosenger, and Dan Dorts; pianist Russell Ward; and the Student Ensemble from Big Spring High School, directed by Ed Wilson, for providing the weekly music. We also thank everyone who provided soup and desserts and helped with the luncheons. \$1,845 was donated to Project Share.
- The Lenten Concerts and Soup Luncheons were held on the five Wednesdays during Lent. The average number served at the luncheons was 48.
- Under the direction of Ron Richcreek, Choir Sunday was held in May.
- All Saints Sunday again included having members bring photos to remember loved ones. We were pleased with the increase in participation this year. We also asked members to leave their pictures for a second Sunday to allow more opportunity to view them.
- The committee voted to replace the garland on the balcony railings, which were about 25 years old. Our new garlands (21 garlands / each 9 feet long) were purchased from Christmas Lights, etc., for \$2567.74.
- A special thanks to those who made donations to the Deck the Halls fund. We received \$1,830 in donations, which brought our total cost to \$837.74.
- The Worship Committee handled decorating the church for the Advent season. Those assisting in putting up and taking down the decorations were Bob Davis, Richard Tritt, Nancy Tritt, Trudy Bailey, Bruce Bailey, Charlie Thompson, Jutta Erb-Rogg, Rick Line, Deb Ryerson, Susan Palyo, Lynda Mann, Bonnie Deardorff, Barb Crum, Fred Seltzer and Deb Richcreek.
- The committee once again offered the sale of both virtual and real poinsettias at Christmas to honor friends and loved ones. 99 live poinsettias were purchased; and \$400 from the virtual poinsettias was donated to My Brother's Table.
- The Advent candles and readings were lit and read by members of this year's confirmation class and their families. They included the Wewer, Weiser, Myers, and Whitman families.
- The Committee organized 13 communions by intinction this year. Home communion was served four times to those on the Care and Concern list.

- Special services held throughout the year included Ash Wednesday (attendance 37), Maundy Thursday (34), Good Friday (15), Easter Sunrise (25), and Christmas Eve (121).

Attendance numbers indicate an average weekly attendance of 66 people, with the highest weekly attendance on March 23 (92), Easter, April 20 (114), and Choir Sunday, May 18 (103).

IN OUR CONGREGATION:

- ~ We reached out to 11-plus members of our congregation on our Care and Concern list through cards, phone calls, visits & Home Communion in an effort to continue to include them as important members of our church
- ~ We continued to coordinate a transportation chain for members who are no longer able to drive to church.
- ~ We provided comfort to twelve members who lost loved ones through our *Journeying Through Grief* program, a series of booklets that give helpful insights on the process of grieving
- ~ We provided *These Days* quarterly devotional booklets (large print format) for members & friends of our congregation.
- ~ We sent notes to the members we prayed for as listed in the weekly bulletin.
- ~ We continued our “Dining with the Deacons” events. Once a month we hosted a dinner at a local restaurant for those who don’t get to go out much, or just like a good time of fellowship. For those who no longer drive, we provided rides to & from events. ALL ARE WELCOME TO JOIN US!
- ~ In honor of Father’s Day, we conducted our annual “Dinner for Dads” event -- our biggest fundraiser of the year. This year the congregation donated \$710. This money is used to fund “My Brothers’ Table” (evening meal program at The Salvation Army) and many other community programs throughout the year.
- ~ We mailed gift cards at Christmas to seven college students.

IN OUR COMMUNITY:

- ~ We gave Visitor Bags with information about First Presbyterian Church’s mission & activities to visitors who worship with us.
- ~ We served three dinners at “My Brothers Table” (The Salvation Army).
- ~ In February we hosted the “Souper Bowl of Caring” luncheon. We raised \$200 and collected 253 cans of soup for Project SHARE.

- ~ In March we donated \$250 each to: Bethany House, Domestic Violence Services of Cumberland/Perry counties, Employment Skills Center, Goodwill EMS, Maranatha, SPY, Tomorrow's Neighbors, and YWCA.
- ~ We provided \$500 of sunscreen to the summer SPY program and raised another \$270 to donate if more was needed.
- ~ We went to Claremont Nursing Home and provided an "Ice Cream Social" for residents. We served 42 people including a few nurses aides. We also gave each resident a small gift.
- ~ We helped with Carlisle's Spooky Saturday, handing out around 525 ghost lollipops along with various other candies.
- ~ We participated in Salvation Army's bell-ringing program, raising \$575.
- ~ We delivered 243 bags of cookies to the Carlisle Truck Stop Ministry to be distributed throughout the region to truckers and people traveling in the area who are missing home
- ~ We sponsored an Angel Tree providing gifts to 16 families, a total of 27 children. Each family was also given a Christmas book, *The First Christmas: The Bible's Nativity Story* by N.T. Wright

IN THE WORLD:

- ~ Together with Presbyterian Woman we sponsored "Blanket Sunday" on Mother's Day, raising \$1100.

The “Books for Babies” program continues to support young families expecting new babies through the Carlisle Area Family Life Center.

A total of 161 kits were donated in 2025, each containing a child’s board book, brochure about the importance of reading to babies, along with an invitation to our church, and a handmade baby hat made by Avis Allen or Debbie Bressler.
